19 September - Defense Intelligence Forum

The next Defense Intelligence Forum will be held at the Alpine Restaurant in Arlington on Wednesday 19 September. Dr. Jan Goldman will speak on "Strategic Warning: Changing the Way We Look At Threats." Dr. Goldman is the author or editor of numerous articles and books to include Ethics of Spying: A Reader for the Intelligence Professional; Words of Intelligence: A Dictionary; and the recently declassified Anticipating Surprise: Analysis for Strategic Warning. In 2006, he organized the first international conference on ethics and intelligence. He is a founding board member of the International Intelligence Ethics Association. He teaches at the National Defense Intelligence College and Georgetown University. He holds a doctorate from George Washington University, and graduate degrees from Virginia Tech and Georgetown University.

Dress will be smart casual – shirts with collars, no shorts, no jeans, and no athletic clothing or shoes. You may wear jackets without ties. DIAA members have bilateral privileges to attend, and the cost will be \$25 for adults, and \$13 for children (ages 6-11).

2 October - DIAA Homecoming

The Defense Intelligence Agency will host our Defense Intelligence Alumni Association Homecoming on 2 October at the Defense Intelligence Analysis Center, Bolling Air Force Base. The program will include a worldwide overview with emphasis on Iraq and Afghanistan, a Defense Intelligence Enterprise update, briefings on programs of special defense intelligence interest, and a review of congressional affairs. The doors will open at 7:30 and coffee and donuts will be available. The program will begin at 8:20 with an introduction to the Director, DIA, LTG Maples. Following Gen Maples remarks, the morning session will include a group photo with DR, a worldwide strategic threat briefing followed by a panel discussion on worldwide strategic threats. Lunch will be served at noon in the Bowman Room. The afternoon program begins at 1300 with a discussion with Phil Roberts, DIA Chief of Staff. The remainder of the afternoon features a Congressional Affairs update, a presentation on China, and a guest speaker, Scott W. Carmichael, author of True Believer - Inside the Investigation and Capture of Ana Montes, Cuba'a Master Spy. The program will end at 1615. Deadline for your reservation to attend the Homecoming event is 18 September.

17 October - Defense Intelligence Forum

Dr. Daniel L. Burghart will speak on Eurasian National Security Issues at the 17 October Forum at the Alpine Restaurant in Arlington. Dr. Burghart is a Professor of National Security and Eurasian Studies at the National Defense Intelligence College He retired in June 2003 as a Colonel with 30 years Army service. He taught at the National Defense University. He served as Senior National Security Policy Advisor at the Defense Threat Reduction Agency, U S. Defense and Army Attaché to Kazakhstan, and a Mission Commander at the On Site Inspection Agency. He was Senior Russian Military Analyst and Eurasian Branch Chief on the Army Staff, Professor of Russian and East European Studies at West Point, and Director of Area Studies at the U. S. Army Russian Institute. Dr. Burghart has a Ph.D. in Russian and International Studies from the University of Surrey. He is the author of Red Microchip: Technology Transfer, Export Control and Economic Restructuring in the Soviet Union, and co-editor with Dr. Theresa Sabonis-Helf of the just-published In the Tracks of Tamerlane: Central Asia's Path to the 21st Century.

Past Events

19 June Defense Intelligence Forum

DIAA together with the National Defense Intelligence College Foundation (NDICF) sponsored a Forum on 19 June at The Alpine Restaurant in Arlington. Mr. Russell Rochte spoke on *From Soft-Power to Soft-War*, which featured lessons learned from his experiences on the Media Staff Ride to Hollywood conducted by the National Defense University in 2005. Mr. Rochte (LTC, USA, Ret) is a faculty member at the National Defense Intelligence College, and formerly was on the National Defense University faculty. He has taught and lectured on aspects of information operations since 1997. He is a frequent lecturer at the NATO School on the topic of Information Power and directs the Information Operations concentration within the MSSI degree program at the NDIC. His talk examined aspects of information as a component of national power, with particular emphasis on recent and potential uses and misuses of the television medium in the "War of Ideas."

18 July Defense Intelligence Forum

DIAA and the NDICF jointly sponsored a Forum on 18 July at the Alpine Restaurant in Arlington. Mr. Allen Kieswetter, a retired Foreign Service officer, spoke on *Islam in the Contemporary World*. His talk included topics such as Mohammad as a feminist, the compatibility of Islam and democracy, and the differences between Shia

and Sunni. He explained that of the 1.3 billion followers of Islam in the world, only 300 million are Arabs. Islamists have widely divergent interpretations of the Koran ranging from "Quietists" who believe that God can take care of Himself and are generally reluctant to become involved in politics, to "Activists" who participate in politics and Command the Faithful, to Jihadists – a small number of extremists who use violence to promote their goals. Mr. Keiswetter teaches courses in Islam and the Middle East at the National Defense Intelligence College. He is also an Adjunct Scholar at the Middle East Institute under whose auspices he has given more that 100 TV and radio interviews. In 2003, he retired as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State in the Near East Bureau after 36 years in the US Foreign Service.

Air America (**AirAm**) served the Agency, but was disbanded in 1975. AirAM is supporting legislation to assist former Air America members who served with such distinction in SEA

There are about 5,000 NSA retirees in the **Phoenix** organization. In response to its member's complaints, Phoenix has succeeded in getting IDs that allow NSA civilian retirees access to Ft Meade. Access to other military bases is at the discretion of the local military commander. The Dep SecDef is now working on a similar policy for retired defense department retirees.

Marine Corps Intelligence Activity (MCIA) is hosting a conference in September at Waterside Hotel in Norfolk to which Gen Pace, CJCS, has been invited.

Mr. Fred Harrison (**NortonNet**) discussed the ongoing initiative to create an "umbrella intelligence organization" that would address "issues of common concern" to the various intelligence-related organizations and associations. He also proposed several future possible initiatives: 1) a National Intelligence Journal – produced independently but available to all intelligence professionals to "get the message out;" 2) NSA and CIA funding college intelligence programs, such as Counter-Drug and Counter-Terrorism courses at the University of Maryland; and 3) creating a "Lobbying Association" to generate topics of interest and to promote the interests of intelligence professionals. NortonNet's database has approx 1500 names, and is good source for people looking for jobs.
