## *Reminder:* DIAC Access Requires Security Clearance

To assist board members, work on DIA's 50th anniversary, or volunteer for the career training and mentoring programs, you'll need DIAC access. However, if you take one of those jobs and you update your SF 86 (see below), DIA will issue you a Level-3 (Secret) badge so that you may enter the DIAC unescorted. Also, in order to attend classified DIA events (like Half-Way Day and Homecoming) you must have an active security clearance, or an upto-date questionnaire for national security positions (SF-86) that's not more than ten years old on file with DIA. DIA will use the questionnaire to grant DIAA members a temporary, one-day Secret-level clearance for the event. If you're not sure that you're up to date, or if you're not young enough to know about SF 86, ask admin@diaalumni.org\_to check your security status. If you know you need to update, download an SF 86 at www.opm.gov/Forms/pdf\_fill/sf86.pdf. (We also have a volunteer to help you.) Fill out the form and FAX it to Kelley Worthy at 703-907-1747. ## Upcoming Events

### Spring Luncheon: 14 April

Our annual Spring Luncheon will be held at the Mt. Vernon Inn on Thursday 14 April at 1130. Mr Bradley Knopp will speak about his time as Chief of the Defense Intelligence Liaison Office in London. Ms Barbara Mays, our liaison with DIA, will provide an update on what's happening at DIA.

Mr. Bradley Knopp is currently the Director of DIA's/ DoD's Joint Foreign Materiel Program Office. In November, he returned from London where he was Chief of the Defense Intelligence Liaison Office since June 2007. There he managed DIA's largest foreign liaison staff and was responsible for operating and building military intelligence relations with the UK's Defense Intelligence Staff and other UK intelligence organizations. Prior to that assignment, Mr. Knopp was the first Director of DIA's Office of International Engagement where he managed DIA's relationships with foreign military intelligence counterparts worldwide. He also supervised DIA's intelligence liaison staffs in London, Ottawa, Canberra, Paris, Tokyo and Tel Aviv and directed a staff that provided support to the more than 150 foreign Defense Attaches in Washington. In other previous assignments, Mr. Knopp was the Chief, Foreign Exchanges and Disclosures, the Defense Intelligence Officer for Europe, and Research Director for DIA's Directorate for Analysis overseeing intelligence production in support of senior policymakers and warfighters.

Mr. Knopp was born in LaGrange, Georgia and graduated magna cum laude from Furman University in 1976 with degrees in Political Science and German. He began his career in DIA in 1979 in the Defense Attache Office, Bern, Switzerland. He was promoted to the Defense Intelligence Senior Level in 1998 and received DIA' Exceptional Civilian Service Award in 1999. In 2002 he was awarded the Grand Decoration of Honor in Silver by the Republic of Austria in recognition of his contribution to bilateral relations. In 2007, Mr. Knopp was awarded the rank of Distinguished Executive by order of the President. Mr. Knopp resides in Alexandria. He studies piano and performs solo and duet recitals.

An email flier will advertise this event and provide more details on topics to be discussed and practical details such as parking.

## Past Events

### Forum: 20 January

Colonel Sergio de la Peña (USA, Retired) spoke on *Mexican Drug Wars: A Practitioner's Perspective* at the 20

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January Defense Intelligence Forum held at the Pulcinella Restaurant in McLean. A former Foreign Area Officer, Colonel de la Peña has eighteen years' experience in Western Hemisphere affairs with an emphasis on stopping growth and transport of drugs. He now is Director of Business Development for the Americas for Military Professional Resources Incorporated. He most recently worked with the Mexican government on countering the drug trade's effect on Mexican security. As Chief of the Northern Command's International Affairs Division, he worked closely with Mexican counterparts to craft the theater's security engagement strategy. He served in the International Army Programs Directorate in Army Training and Doctrine Command, as Army Attaché in Venezuela, as Army Section Chief in the US Military Group-Chile, and as commander of the US Military Observer Group-Washington. Colonel de la Peña was born in Chihuahua, Mexico. He was commissioned in Air Defense Artillery and is both Airborne and Ranger qualified. He holds a BS from the University of Iowa and a Masters Degree in Military Arts and Science.

De la Peña explained that there has been a long history of smuggling across the US-Mexican border. The wellestablished smuggling mechanisms combined with widespread corruption practices have facilitated the drug trade. By the 1980s, drug kingpins established syndicates and expanded and enforced their areas of operation to control the lucrative drug smuggling. During the Clinton Administration there was significant conflict between the drug cartels. During the Bush administration, as the relationship between the President and Mexican President Fox deteriorated following the Government of Mexico's response to 9/ 11, the cartels strengthened and became even more competitive. Drug bosses were killed and their underlings attacked each other to gain supremacy. The Calderon presidency has witnessed a break from past counter-drug efforts. Calderon deployed the military to fight the drug cartels, even in his home state.

De la Peña stated that violence will persist as long as the US demand for illegal drugs continues. He noted that border corruption is migrating to the US where personnel are increasingly vulnerable to bribery. In the meanwhile, the US-Mexican military-to- military relationship is at an all time high. De la Peña commented that the Mexican Army resists corruption by frequently moving/swapping their units. He said the Mexican Army needs to re-establish its relationship with the Drug Enforcement Agency.

#### Forum: 24 February

Colonel W. Patrick Lang, USA (Ret), spoke on The Islamic World Today at the 24 February Defense Intelligence Forum held at the Pulcinella Restaurant in McLean. Colonel Lang is a retired Army Military Intelligence, Special Forces, and Foreign Area Officer. In his last active duty assignment, he was Defense Intelligence Officer for the Middle East, South Asia, and Terrorism. Following retirement, he became the first Director of the Defense HUMINT Service for which he was awarded Presidential Rank of Distinguished Executive. He was the first Arabic Language professor at West Point. After leaving government, he served ten years as a business executive for a company operating in the Middle East and South Asia. He is a consultant for television and radio, including The News Hour with Jim Lehrer. He wrote Intelligence: the Human Factor, a definitive text on human intelligence collection operations, as well as several novels based on Confederate secret services in the Civil War. He is a VMI graduate and has a Masters Degree in Middle East Studies from the University of Utah.

Lang explained that the unrest in the Arab/Islamic world stems from its having a huge population surplus of the young and unemployed. There is a pattern of large families but no thought to family planning. The result is having two tectonic plates moving against one another: the autocratic regime vs. a growing dissatisfied citizenry.

In **Egypt**, while it is difficult to predict the outcome of future elections, civilians are unlikely to assume real authority over the military. A more open system is possible but with military control and probably the continuation of the emergency decree. Nor did Lang predict if and when those in power would repeal the emergency decree. He did comment that the economic situation in Egypt will not change very quickly because there are not enough resources and jobs to go around. Egypt needs effective family planning before they can achieve political stability. When asked about the Muslim Brotherhood, Lang said that if they were patient and bide their time over the long, long run, they could eventually ascend to power. The establishment of Shari'a Law would not be good for Egypt. It would be best for Egypt to remain a secular state.

In **Yemen**, the government controls only a few tribes and there is often warfare between various tribes, communities and outlying areas. The tribes are concentrated in a few

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towns and there is warfare between these towns and outlying areas. Lang commented that President Saleh, a Shia, directly participated in the assassination of the two preceding Presidents. Saleh hates al-Qaeda and Lang thinks that he will survive the current unrest.

**Bahrain** is ruled by Sunni Muslims and is closely (politically and geographically) aligned to Saudi Arabia. The Bahraini Shias (the majority of the population) are not downtrodden but have rising expectations and want more. The Saudi Royals are not going to let the unrest in Bahrain spread.

Libya has a population of 5 million spread among disparate regions. The state was created by the Italians. The former King was supported only by his own tribe. In 1969, a Signal Corps Captain, Qaddafi conducted a coup and the King was disposed. The current unrest is following Tunisia's example of a population rebelling against Qaddafi's long-standing autocratic regime but based on tribal affiliation and geographic areas.

**Tunisia** is a prime example of the blending of French and Arabic cultures. Of all the countries in the Arab World, it was the logical place for a revolution to occur. It was the first example of a "Revolution of Rising Expectations." Lang explained that the population must experience some degree of success in order to revolt. The Tunisians are somewhat advanced, are well-educated, and now want more.

Young King Abdullah of **Jordan** is willing to relinquish some concessions to his people and switch to a constitutional monarchy. However, the tribes do not want democracy. If there were a revolt and it escalated to large-scale bloodshed, Abdullah would probably abdicate.

When asked about the outlook for a revolt in **Iran**, Lang replied that the level of unhappiness there is not yet high enough to foment change.

### Forum: 24 March

The Defense Forum at the Pulcinella Restaurant in McLean on 24 March featured Mr. Eric Jens who spoke on the *Prospects and Challenges for International Security Assistance and US Forces in Afghanistan.* Mr. Jens has just returned from a tour as Chief of the Human Intelligence Operations Cell for US and allied forces in Afghanistan. He teaches intelligence collection, ethics, and law at the National Defense Intelligence College. He joined the College faculty following four years in the Global Division of the Defense HUMINT Service. Starting as a Russian linguist and SIGINT specialist, he has over twenty years' experience in Signals and Human Intelligence. He served several years as an Army reservist in DIA assignments in Washington D.C., Seattle, and Iraq, including watch officer, strategic debriefer, and HUMINT collection team chief. His deployments with DIA include one tour with the Iraq Survey Group in Baghdad and three tours in Afghanistan, where he twice served as Chief of the DIA Detachment at Bagram. Mr. Jens holds a B.A. in English from University of California, Los Angeles, and a J.D. from University of Michigan Law School. He is a graduate of the U.S. Army Intelligence School and the Defense Language Institute.

## Civilian Access Card: How do you Obtain One?

Retired DIA civilians can obtain a Civilian Access Card (CAC) at the DIAC or at the nearest RAPIDS (Real-time Automated Personnel Identification System) Site. The RAPIDS site locator: http://www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl/owa/home

The CAC confirms your identity as a retired DoD employee and facilitates access to military bases. In order to obtain one, you need a copy of your SF-52/SF-50 retirement form as well as two forms of identification: a drivers license, passport, voters registration card, retired military ID or military dependent ID card, original or certified copy of birth certificate, or a social security card. 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### Patriot's Corner

Col (ret) William Thomas Price III (Tom), USAF Tom Price passed away on November 3, 2010 from complications from a stroke. Tom was married to his high school sweetheart, Fran, for 52 years. He graduated from Kansas State University before being commissioned in the Air Force. He received a Master's Degree in International Relations from the University of Southern California in London. He spent three tours in the Pentagon, two in DIA. His first DIA tour was as an Israeli Desk Officer in J2. He served as the Director of Operational Intelligence at USAFE at Ramstein, Germany and continued in that position at PACAF at Hickam AFB, Hawaii. Tom returned to J2 in 1985 as spent a year as a DDI before becoming the Assistant J2 to Adm Tom Brooks. He retired as a colonel from that position in DIA after 28 years of service in the Air Force. He went on to work for Rand Corporation supporting the intelligence community. During his career he received many awards including the Bronze Star for meritorious service in Vietnam where he served two tours of duty. Tom left the Washington area in 2006 and moved to his dream home in Hyde Park, Utah. He was a devout Mormon. Tom is survived by his wife, 5 children, 20 grandchildren and 7 great-grand children.

#### Mr. Horace W. "Pick" Brooks

Mr. Horace W. "Pick" Brooks, 83, who retired from DIA in 1995, passed away on 1 December 2010.

### Admiral John L. Butts

Former Director of Naval Intelligence Admiral John L. Butts (DNI from August 1982 to September 1985) passed away on 13 January.

### Martin Gorman

Martin Gorman passed away unexpectedly on 26 January. Mr. Gorman served at DIA from 1988 to 2005. He was initially a Soviet strategic defense analyst, and then a Russian strategic forces analyst. He supported Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm as an air/air defense analyst and Operations Vigilant Warrior and Southern Watch as the National Intelligence Support Team Chief in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia in 1994. He served as the Senior Intelligence Officer for both the China/East Asia Office and the Russia/Eurasia Office. He also served as the Director of Intelligence Programs on the National Security Council staff while he was a DIA employee. Mr. Gorman left DIA in 2005 to take a Defense Intelligence Senior Executive Service position at the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense of Intelligence (USD(I)). He was serving as the Director of Forecasting and Warning at USD(I) at the time of his death. He is survived by his wife, Stephanie, and a son.

### Col David L. Kiffer (USMC, Ret)

Col David L. Kiffer USMC (Ret), passed away on 28 January after a short illness. Kiffer had a long association with NSA and DIA. He was previously assigned as Chief, Military Operations, NSA Plans and Readiness Office. He was most recently the Deputy DIA Representative to NSA. Kiffer's assignment included tours on the USCINCPAC J5 staff and with the Third Marine Division on Okinawa as Commanding Officer 1<sup>st</sup> Bn, 4th Marines. Later, Colonel Kiffer served on the 3<sup>rd</sup> MARDIV Staff as the AC/S, G2; as II MEF AC/S G2; on the JCS, J2 as Deputy Director for Joint Staff Support, J2J; and as President of the Naval Discharge Review Board. Colonel Kiffer is the recipient of the Silver Star Medal, two awards of the Purple Heart Medal, the Defense Superior Service Medal, and the Legion of Merit Medal as well as numerous other campaign medals. Kiffer served in the U.S. Marines for over 30 years in assignment around the globe and in various conflicts as both an infantry and an intelligence officer. Kiffer is survived by his parents; wife, Susan, and three children. Burial was at Arlington National Cemetery on 22 March.

### Col Rod Medford (USA, Ret)

Col Rod Medford (USA,Ret) died on 31 January. Col Medford was career Army MI, and served as LTG Hughes' Exec in the late 1990's. Gen Hughes personally recruited Rod as he had known and worked for Gen Hughes in previous tours. Rod was a long term member of the DIAA Board of Directors, and served as the Treasurer. His support, dedication, and loyalty were above reproach – he could be trusted with the most difficult jobs, and often was. When Rod took on a duty— no matter how difficult — it was always done right.

More recently, Rod worked as GRS Vice President for Intelligence Support Operations. Rod joined GRS in October of 2008, to initially provide intelligence support

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requirements for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), serving as a Senior Policy Analyst. He quickly became the recognized expert who would lead the drafting of key policy directives to stand up the Office of the Functional Manager for Collection Management. After concluding this work, his responsibilities were expanded to Program Manager, overseeing 3 contracts supporting the DIA client. Rod was the recipient of the GRS 2010 Executive Leadership Award and was recently promoted to Vice President of GRS's Intelligence Support Operations Business Unit.

Rod leaves his wife, Dr. Gail Medford, and two sons. He will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery at 1100 on 31 March. Attendees are asked to be at the Visitors Center 30 minutes prior.

Joseph D. DiSalvo died suddenly on 22 February. He was assigned to the Enterprise IT Operations Group, Office for SE CONUS-RSC, CENTCOM Division. In October 2006, as part of the DS RSC mass transfer, Mr. DiSalvo became a DIA employee and served as an IT Specialist/Executive Assistant. Prior to his DIA assignment, DiSalvo was an IT Specialist with the Department of the Air Force at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Florida. He served in the USAF from 1997 to 2003. He is survived by his parents and two children.

#### Gary Bohl (Feb 22)

Gary Bohl died on 22 February. He came to DIA as a USAF captain in the 1970s, then transitioned to a civilian position as an Africa military capabilities analyst. Known for his keen intellect, Gary considered himself a member of the Africa corps in DIA, and frequently arranged social get togethers for DIA Africanists.

#### Jere L. Richardson

Jere L. Richardson, former DIA employee, died on 22 February. Mr. Richardson served in the Defense Collection Directorate. He is survived by his wife Nancy, and four children.

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### **Tom Dillon**

Tom Dillon, a former DIA and DoD HUMINT specialist, died on 1 March. His funeral will be on 11 May at 12:35 at the Old Post Chapel on Ft. Meyer, followed by burial at Arlington National Cemetery.

### Mary Jean Bieck

Mary Jean Bieck of Falls Church Virginia, died on 17 March. She worked briefly as an assistant to the writer, James Michener. For almost 35 years she was an Intelligence Research Specialist with DIA. She moved from DB to DH in 1985. From 1985 until her retirement in 2003, Mary Jean served as a Reports Officer for several countries to include Ireland, England, Canada, Belgium, and Norway.
