18 October Fall Luncheon and Annual Meeting at Ft. Myer Officers Club

At our Annual meeting we were honored to have Gen Michael Hayden as our guest speaker. Gen Hayden's talk reflected his extensive Intelligence Community (IC) background which included his service as a Director of CIA, Deputy Director of National Intelligence, and Director of NSA. He was the third military intelligence professional to reach the four-star rank – the others are Adm Studeman and Adm Inman (DIAA member), both served as Deputy DCI. General Alexander was also promoted to the four star rank, but as CYBERCOM Commander, and DIRNSA.

Gen Hayden started out by explaining how he talks to the media, and how the media lens is different than the intel lens. Intel is fact based, and so is inductive and pessimistic – a CIA analyst would smell the flowers, and then look for the hearse. He then related how intel analysis can drive policy – sometimes inadvertently. Hayden cited the Syrian crisis as one example of the complexity of the intel-policy interface. It is essential to get the facts right and the story correct. But how do you do this when there are approximately 1200 diverse groups represented in the conflict? And how does one sort out the dominant narrative in Syria? Is it primarily a humanitarian crisis, a

sectarian conflict between Sunni and Shia, or a reflection of the larger east-west divide?

Gen Hayden then turned his remarks to his "Friends and Family" discussion – how the ODNI organization allows the DCI to concentrate on his own organization, and not be responsible for heading the entire IC. To make the current organizational structure work, three factors are necessary: First, the IC has to have the right person as DNI, and in this regard, Hayden praised DNI Clapper and Admiral Blair for their superb DNI leadership roles. Second, the DNI must have a close working relationship with the President that he serves. And third, the DNI must have a favorable working relationship with the Director, CIA.

Another key aspect of the IC that Gen Hayden mentioned is how much intelligence work is now accomplished by the private sector. He said that intelligence is not as reliant on stolen secrets as it used to be, and most of what is needed is publically retrievable. At issue is our transparency and intel's ability to do what is required in the future. In view of the recent Snowden and Manning unauthorized disclosures, Hayden cautioned that we in the IC "must be careful that we don't turn too much on ourselves" and thus become like the "Stasi." He also added that the IC shared info much better than what the 9/11 Commission acknowledged. He commented that many bureaucratic impediments to info sharing are no longer valid. The capture of the underwear bomber was cited as a successful intel sharing case.

Gen Hayden ended his remarks by saying that he recently told an audience that the Internet and cyber advances represent the biggest external change to humankind since the discovery of the Western Hemisphere. Someone in his audience added that what is going on with cyber advances is more akin to the initiation of language. Gen Hayden added that cyber represents a fundamental internal change in the way the brain functions – the brain itself remains the same, but it is wired differently. He remarked that the future of Intelligence rests in the hands of the next generation, who are part and parcel of the new way of thinking.

DIAA Sponsors Award for Attache Support Class

The selectee will be presented a silver pen and a DIAA coin from the membership of DIAA. We are also working with JMAS to permanently place a plaque, on which each winner's name will be inscribed, next to a display that features SSG Hobson in the school.

DIAA HOME PAGE - WHAT'S NEW?

Since June the Board of Directors has been working to improve the flow of information to the Alumni, increase the timeliness of the DIAALog and enhance the functionality of the DIAA Webpage. Recently we added a feature to the DIAA's "Members Only" page. On this password protected page a version of the DIAA 2013 Membership Directory is posted. This Directory, like the annual hardcopy directory mailed in February, lists the members in

Recently, the directory has been restructured to include a geographical breakdown of the DIAA membership at the end of the traditional alpha listing.
