The Keynote Speaker will be **General Michael V. Hayden, USAF (Ret)** former Director, Central Intelligence (DCI). Prior to assuming his duties at Langley, Gen Hayden served as the country's first Principal Deputy Director of National Intelligence and was the highest-ranking intelligence officer in the armed forces. Earlier, he served as Director of the National Security Agency, Commander of the Air Intelligence Agency, Director of the Joint Command and Control Warfare Center, and Chief of the Central Security Service. Earlier in his career he served DIA as an Air Attaché in Sofia, Bulgaria. Gen Hayden is currently a Distinguished Visiting Professor at George Mason University.

## September DIF - AN ENORMOUS SUCCESS

MajGen Michael E. Ennis, USMC (ret) spoke on "Intelligence Contributions to DIA and the Intelligence Community by the U.S. Military Liaison Mission (US-MLM) Collecting on the Group of Soviet Forces Germany" at the DIAA hosted Defense Intelligence Forum (DIF) on 17 September. Several attendees commented that Mike Ennis' talk was one of the more interesting and entertaining DIF presentations in recent memory. While the DIF's adherence to Chatham House rules prevents the disclosure of MajGen Ennis' "sensitive" comments, the following scene setter provides the historical context of his talk.

After the defeat of Germany at the end of WWII, the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union formed the *European Advisory Commission*. France later joined as the 4th commission member. The Commission remained in effect until German unification on 3 October 1990. The missions were initially first tasked to monitor the implementation of the Potsdam Conference agreements, which included the disarming and demilitarization of Germany. Another task was to establish communications between the 4-party commanders.

The primary task of the US-MLM evolved into surveillance and reconnaissance of the Soviet Forces on the ground and by air. The estimation of Soviet troop strength, observation of new equipment and military exercises became the daily routine. The importance of the MLM can't be over estimated as they were the first to distinguish a large maneuver from a buildup of troops which could have potentially resulted in a nuclear conflict. Members of the mission enjoyed a de facto diplomatic status which became priceless with the building of the iron curtain dividing the western zones from the Soviet zone.

MajGen Ennis was one of the few Marine officers selected for the Army's Russian Foreign Area Officer program where he became a Russian linguist, a Soviet specialist and a member of the MLM.

Editors' Note: The All-Source Analysts working the Soviet/ Warsaw Pact threat used MLM reporting and photography regularly in DIA reports and briefings. The MLM reports provided a collateral source of invaluable information on Soviet threat capabilities, and especially their tactics, strategy and doctrine. In addition, MLM photography allowed further analysis of new and unique Soviet capabilities that were subsequently used to address US/NATO vulnerabilities.

## FEDS FEEDS FAMILIES FOOD DRIVE ENDS ON A HIGH NOTE

The 2013 "Feds Feeds Families" program just closed out with over 6,500 lbs. of food contributed by current and retired DIA employees to feed less fortunate families. This is the second consecutive year that DIAA played a role in supporting the "Feds Feeds Families" food drive. This year we asked attendees at the DIAA hosted June, July and August DIFs to bring a bag containing food and household items on the list provided by DIA. DIAA donations easily filled the cargo area of an SUV. At the conclusion of the collection effort DIAA received a hearty "THANK YOU and WELL DONE" note from DIA.

## DIA-DIAA PARTNERSHIP: PROFESSIONAL ANALYST CAREER EDUCATION (PACE)

Last month we reported that DIA is developing a new analytic training program called Professional Analyst Career Education (PACE). This DI and Training and Education Directorate (TED) partnership will provide immersive and rigorous training over the course of 16 weeks to 25 analysts (GS-11 and below) from across the Defense Intelligence enterprise. DIA will run two pilots this fiscal year, with the first one starting on 28 October. The PACE curriculum focuses on critical and creative thinking, communication, teamwork, and customer engagement. The PACE team has expressed interest in having at least one alumni panel / brown bag lunch during each of the pilots. DIA welcomes DIAA member's willingness to share their wisdom with these analysts as they move up the career ladder.
